SPONSORS TRAVEL TO GUATEMALA TO VISIT FAMILIES AND PROJECTS



FOOT POWERED SEWING MACHINES NEEDED FOR FAMILIES

Electricity is an amenity that is scarce in the Guatemalan highlands. This is especially true for families living in the most remote communities that have no public services. All the women and men who participate in sewing courses offered in one of the training centers learn on foot powered treadle style sewing machines. Once a sewing student masters the basics of measuring, cutting and stitching a pattern for a particular project such as "traje" or traditional Mayan clothing, they can potentially earn an income selling handmade garments made at home in the local marketplace or use their skills to sew for others in surrounding communities. A typical treadle sewing machine costs \$400 in Guatemala, which is out of reach for most families. Luckily, there have been many generous donations in the past to help supplement the cost of these machines.
