Advanced Sewing Course

In coordination with INTECAP, Family-to-Family offered an eight-month advanced sewing course in New Ixtahuacan. This challenging course included local business requirements, technical skills such as hems,



buttons, zippers, darts and pleats, the creation of blouses, skirts, dresses, jackets and pants, and self-employment skills. Twelve students successfully persevered through the entire training and passed the final practical exam, sewing a dress like the one shown in the photo on the left.

Upon graduating from this course, Aura, an FTF program participant who also completed the cooking course, dedicated one room of her new home to her own tailoring business. In Aura's



words, "I am delighted to be able to work...people come to me requesting collars, skirts, aprons, beaded adornments...I thank you for this opportunity and I pray that God gives you (FTF) the life ahead to continue, so that more families benefit."

New Laboratory Opening

For many years, Family-to-Family contributed financially to medical programs in Guatemala. In 2020, the FTF Board made a decision to focus on its founding mission of supporting economic development projects, housing, and skills training and to direct remaining healthcare funds to existing clinics in the areas we serve. Since then, under the direction of Dr. Jose Miguel Vasquez, these funds have been used for COVID-19 supplies, staff salaries, clinic repairs and improvements, and to construct a laboratory at the Novillero clinic. The laboratory equipment was provided through a separate donation from Jerry and Clara Monks. The formal opening and blessing of the diagnostic laboratory was celebrated on February 8, 2023.
